FROM THE DESK OF THE SUPERVISOR

We made it! One of the coldest and snowiest winters ever is now over. For those of us who didn't head South it has seemed like it would never end, but here we are on the other end and looking forward to the Spring days ahead.

I want to commend Brian Bernard and the Highway crew for keeping our roads clear and salted. Many night and week end hours were given up to keep the roads clear.

I would also like to commend Brian Rayburn, of the Village, who oversees the Town's water and sewer. Unfortunately we have had many water pipes break these last weeks of March, with the thawing of the ground. Brian and his crew have had to put in many long hours finding and repairing the leaks.

As I write this newsletter we are finally beginning the water replacement project for District Nos. 1 & 2. The project will involve the North side of Wheeler Station Rd. and the Town section of Routes 5 & 20. The construction crew has assured us that they will try to be as least disruptive as possible for traffic patterns and water supplies to the property owners who will be affected. We do not have a work schedule at this point, but as we receive it we will be putting it on the Town website.

We have proclaimed May 2 as "Drummers' Heritage Day" along with the Town of West Bloomfield. It is a day to honor the local veterans of the American Revolutionary War, who are buried in our East Bloomfield Cemetery. The event will involve music from the Revolutionary era played on fife and drums, along with a brief narration about the lives of drummer boys during the War for Independence. This is led by Bill Cahn, Associate Professor at the Eastman School of Music. I encourage our residents to participate in this special day.

HELLO FROM THE HIGHWAY HAPPY SPRING TO ALL!

Wow! What a long winter!

As everyone knows we had a busy winter here at the highway department. Our highway crew did a great job in keeping up with the conditions thrown at us. We had consistently cold weather that resulted in us holding off on our salting operations. Thus allowing us to loan salt to other towns, since this is our second winter where our salt vendor could not keep up with the demand and some of our neighboring towns had a shortage.

After we take down the snow fences and clean up any plow damage, we will begin getting ready for our summer road work.

In May, if weather is good, we will stone and oil the following roads: Pond Road, Steele Road, Stetson Road, Stirnie Road, Townline Road, Oakmount

Road and Woolston Road east of Flatiron.

In June and July after school gets out, we are planning to replace all cross culverts on Whalen Road. We will also be cleaning all town ditches in this area. Traffic on Wheeler Station Road will be detoured for a week or so as we work on cleaning the ditches. We will do our best to work around the water line replacement project that will be going on during this time.

In August we will black top the following roads in preparation for stone and oiling in 2016: Studick Road, Wheeler Station Road and Woolston Road. We will also be leveling and wedging on Whalen Road for possible repaying in 2016.

The above road work will be completed depending on the weather.

As always please slow down in all work zones. We all have families we want to go home to each night.

ANTIQUE WIRELESS ASSOCIATION NEWS:

Through the combined efforts of the Antique Wireless volunteers and Chrisanntha Construction, progress continues to complete Phase II at the museum.

The construction company recently added a 6' x 8' door in the west wall of the museum to facilitate the transfer of the disassembled audio control center from its location in the storage area at the Conference Center to the museum area dedicated to Phase II. It will be reassembled for public display when this section of the museum is dedicated during the opening day of the AWA International Conference on August 11th.

The vacated storage area at the Conference Center has allowed Chrisanntha Construction to double the existing storage capacity by adding a second floor and to modify one of the two large garage doors to allow the construction of a lift area, providing access to the second floor in addition to the existing stairway.

The AWA volunteers have begun the task of tagging every item in the back of the museum for alternate destinations as that portion of the museum is totally emptied to accommodate the development of Phase II this year, and later, Phase III, the 72 seat multi-use theater.

The Annex at Veteran's Park has been temporarily leased to stage items destined for sale during the "Spring Meet" on the morning of May 2nd and the large artifact and print auction to be held at Peddler's Antiques that afternoon by Estes Auction, the premier electronics auctioneer in the United States.

The AWA Spring Meet is an annual event of the museum, held every first Saturday each May and open to the public. A tail gate flea market of electronic items is held in the parking lot and coffee and donuts are available at the Lodge throughout the morning. Sellers may set up at 7:00 AM (\$12.00) and buyers may arrive at 8:00 AM (\$5.00) to purchase print material and artifacts in the Annex. The museum will open for tours a 10:00 AM at a special Spring Meet rate of \$5.00 and the Estes Auction will take place, after a break for lunch, at 1:00 PM.. Lunch can be had a Peddlers Antiques before the auction and locations in the Village.

At 7:00 PM on Tuesday, May 12th, Karen Noske will present the second in her series of "Iconic Women in Radio", featuring Hedy Lamarr, known by many for her original radio and sultry movie roles, but virtually unknown for her series of electronic inventions which aided efforts during World War II. The presentation will be at the museum(\$4.00).

William Cahn, professor at the Eastman School of Music has organized a program featuring fife and drum music of the Revolutionary War with a special emphasis on the lives of drummer boys. A roll call will be read of the names of Revolutionary War soldiers buried in East Bloomfield cemeteries.
